INTRODUCTION

Ranavirus is relatively new disease in the UK and usually infects common frogs.

It is thought to have spread from North America through commercial importation of goldfish and bullfrogs.

A clear indicator of ranavirus in a population is **mass mortalities** in or around ponds during **summer**. Especially if individuals are thin or lethargic a few days prior.

The virus is only active in warm temperatures, so mass mortalities outside of the **summer months** may have another cause.

However, populations can be infected with and have no clinical signs of infection.

SYMPTOMS

- Skins ulcers found on underside of pelvic region, hind limb and feet
- Loss of digits
- Internal bleeding/bleeding from the mouth/cloaca (seen as redenning of underside)
- Lethargy
- Emaciation

CONSERVATION IMPLICATIONS

- Ranavirus is understudied, so the implication are unknown
- Sometimes populations recover
- Others can have a long term decline of up to 80%
