Welcome to the second issue of our newsletter. This edition has lots of news to share and looks ahead to the 2025 Toad Patrol. It also includes details of the AGM and other dates for your diary, as well as information about the new booking system for our events, including scrub clearance and training.

The committee would also like to congratulate Maiya Evans (Chair) and Kayleigh Woodhouse (Toad Patrol coordinator) for receiving the Notts Wildlife Trust 'Wilder Champion Award'. This award recognises those individuals who are having a positive impact on nature in their community. Maiya's award is in the Under 25 section (Highly Commended), and Kayleigh's is in the Over 25 category.

From The Chair

This has been a remarkably successful year for NARG. We kicked off the year with toad patrols, which proved to be highly effective, resulting in the rescue of 1,780 Common Toads, 41 Common Frogs, 80 Smooth Newts, and 13 Great Crested Newts. Our heartfelt thanks to all of the volunteers who dedicated their time to help save our amphibians! In particular, we must acknowledge Kay, our Toad Patrol Coordinator, and the site coordinators for their outstanding organisation of these efforts.

This year, our members had the opportunity to attend 14 events, during which they were able to observe Grass Snakes, Common Lizards, Slow Worms, Common Toads, Common Frogs, Smooth Newts and Great Crested Newts. The most popular event was 'Above and Below', organised in collaboration with the Notts Bat Group. We started by searching for

newts, and then conducted a bat survey, during which participants had the opportunity to observe Daubenton's Bats swooping over one of the lakes.

In 2024, we not only conducted more surveys than in previous years, but we also ran stalls at a number of additional events. We acquired new tables, information boards, banners and a gazebo, which significantly enhanced our presence. One particularly notable event was the stall we ran for two days at Sherwood Forest (see pic). Our primary objective was to actively engage children, so we offered a variety of craft activities, and invited kids to make pipe-cleaner snakes, frog masks and snake crowns. By the second day, we had exhausted our craft materials and had to pack up early! In addition to these activities, we also conducted a reptile survey using visual monitoring techniques while searching around fence posts and fallen logs. In total, we observed 32 common lizards.



Throughout the year, our committee also regularly surveyed several new sites across Nottinghamshire, all of which proved fruitful, with numerous species.

In addition to our work in Nottinghamshire, several committee members helped out in other counties. We made multiple visits to Cannock Chase in Staffordshire, where we engaged in public outreach, reptile surveys and pond dipping. Notts ARG also visited Lincolnshire to help train people in in reptile-surveying techniques.

Our group has recently undergone a significant change – namely, we have a new logo! It was time for a fresh look, and we wanted a design that better represents Notts ARG. The new logo appears at the beginning of this very newsletter (top left). We also now have a dedicated Toad Patrol logo, which will be used across all related materials. In addition, we have launched a Teemill store featuring clothing branded with our new logo.

Special thanks to Anna Maka for her work on the logo's.

In closing this report, I would just 1 i k e to thank all those who volunteered with us this year, and special thanks to Nottinghamshire Trent University Conservation Society (CONSOC), Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust, Forestry England, National Trust, RSPB, Derbyshire Amphibian and Reptile Group, ARGUK, Nottinghamshire County Council, Friends of Newstead and Annesley Country Park and White Post Farm for allowing us to survey their sites/run events.

Work Parties

If you're anything like the rest of the committee, when you see a date announced for the scrub clearance, you think "Oh dear, I'm planning on washing my hair that day" or search for some other excuse to get out of it. At least, that's our first thought...! But sometimes we've even had to cancel scrub-clearance events due to lack of numbers. The fact is that unless we do this work, we can't do surveys – because the reptiles and amphibians will lose their habitat, and the species will be gone. Scrub clearance is the most important part of our work. It has a huge impact on wildlife. Reptiles especially need basking areas and places to hide and forage. parties create these areas for them by spending a few hours clearing spaces. It's also a good way to meet other people who share the same interests – and it's a good workout that's cheaper than the gym! You don't need any experience or equipment (unless you want to bring your own). You'll have a good time meeting new and old friends, and having a chat and laugh. It's a very relaxed atmosphere and the work is not too strenuous -just do what you can. We have lined up a few days in January. See the last page for details.




Social Media

You'll find us on Instagram and Facebook (on the latter, we have both our main NARG account and a new Toad Patrol page).



2024 Results

2024 marked the second year of Notts ARG's involvement in toad patrols across Nottinghamshire, and my first year volunteering as Toad Patrol coordinator. Patrols commenced early – at some sites, toads began crossing in the first week of February. We observed two distinct peaks in amphibian crossings, interspersed by week-long cold spells: one around 15th February, another around 12th March. During the 2024 season, we successfully saved:

- 1,780 Common Toads
- 41 Common Frogs
- 80 Smooth Newts
- 13 Great Crested Newts (GCN)



This success is the result of the dedication of our hard-working volunteers, coupled with the excellent publicity generated by the patrols. Notably, we were featured on the front page of the *Nottingham Post* and in online articles by the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust and Nottinghamshire Biodiversity Action Group (BAG). Cont. P3

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New Sites Registered and Ongoing Efforts


We registered four new patrol sites during the 2024 season: Oaks Lane, Lamin's Lane, Crow Lane and Pleasley Mills (the site with the most amphibians in 2024). We are continually seeking new sites that require patrols, so if you observe amphibians crossing roads in areas without established patrols, please do let us know. Currently, we have 53 patrollers registered with Froglife, and we have already received enquiries from five new individuals expressing interest in becoming patrollers for the 2025 season.

2024 Challenges and Improvements for 2025

We are currently developing a comprehensive document that addresses gaps in the existing Toad Patrol guidelines. It includes detailed information on species identification, toad welfare and the importance of biosecurity. The document is almost complete, and will be circulated to patrollers before the start of the season.



We have scheduled a training event to introduce and implement the new guidelines.



Although this event was originally just for Nottinghamshire patrollers, it is now being promoted by ARG UK and several other ARG groups. This broadens its reach and allows patrollers from across the country to benefit from the training.

Data collection proved to be somewhat cumbersome in 2024, as we relied on Google Drive spreadsheets. After the first week of patrols, many volunteers stopped using the spreadsheets and instead shared their results through WhatsApp groups.

While this helped spread awareness and encourage participation, it also meant that each morning I had to manually update the spreadsheets by reviewing the multiple messages that had been sent overnight. In 2025, we will streamline this process, starting by trailing a mobile-friendly form for volunteers to complete. This will make data collection easier and more efficient for everyone.

Thanks to Derbyshire ARG, we now have four 'toad crossing' road signs. We will be reaching out to local councils to request permission to install these signs where they are most needed.
